Courtney L. Bradley, PharmD, BCACP



Courtney Bradley received her Doctorate of Pharmacy degree from the UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy in 2013. After graduation, Courtney completed a PGY1 Community Pharmacy Residency with Kroger Pharmacy and the University of Cincinnati College of Pharmacy. During this time, she provided disease state management in a community pharmacy through a city-wide employer contract with Kroger Pharmacy. Additionally, at the Cincinnati Health Department, she participated in collaborative practice surrounding diabetes care. She was also an adjunct instructor at the University of Cincinnati where she focused her teaching efforts in skills lab and a therapeutic lifestyles elective. Following her residency, Courtney returned to North Carolina to complete an Academic Postdoctoral Fellowship in the Pharmaceutical Care Labs (PCL) at UNC Eshelman School of Pharmacy. During this time, she served as the course-coordinator for two courses within the PCL series. Additionally, Courtney continued exploring pharmacy practice by volunteering at Senior PharmAssist in Durham, the Geriatric Specialty Clinic at UNC Health Care, and the Carolina Assessment of Medication Program Clinic at UNC Health Care. Following fellowship, Courtney began a new position at High Point University's Fred Wilson School of Pharmacy where she currently serves as the Applied Laboratory Coordinator and Assistant Professor of Clinical Sciences. She is responsible for coordinating six required skills lab courses and a required Introduction to Pharmacy Practice Course. Courtney has continued to practice in community pharmacy by volunteering at Deep River Drug a few hours per week. She

has also continued to be an active member of NCAP by serving for the past three years as a member of the Community Care Practice Forum Executive Committee. Courtney has also been involved in NCAP's Education Committee by serving as the chair of the Annual Convention Project Team for the past two years.

David Catalano is a Pharmacy Manager at Carolina Behavioral Care. His primary function is managing a closed-door pharmacy supporting the health and well-being of the clinic's psychiatric patients. The pharmacy works in unison with the medical team to support positive outcomes of their patients. Previously, he was a Manager of a Specialty Pharmacy for Walgreens, serving to oversee Pharmacy services for HIV, Hep C, Transplant and other Pharmacy services. David received a Bachelor of Science degree in Zoology in 1987 and a Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmacy in 1994, both degrees from the University of Rhode Island. David was quickly promoted to pharmacy manager at Walgreens, running the department until 1997 when he was asked to relocate to Tidewater,

VA to assist in managing the growth of a new Walgreens market. In 2003, David was promoted to a supervisor's position and relocated to Raleigh, NC to supervise the growth of Walgreens in NC beyond the Charlotte market.
